## **Opening Remarks**

One of the 17 Global Goals is to end hunger, achieve food security and improve nutrition, and promote sustainable agriculture. The Global Goals intend to build on the progress achieved under the historic Millennium Development Goals.

Recently, in addition to well-known international development keywords, such as "climate change", "food security" and "poverty alleviation", we, international groups and communities, have also been paying attention to several new and relevant keywords such as "nutrition security", "establishment of food value chains", "resilience", "inclusive development" and "participatory research and development". These emerging keywords focus on qualitative aspects of development rather than just the qualitative expansion of the economy as represented by the GDP growth rates.

Today's symposium, therefore, will zero in on "quality", which is a common aspect of these emerging keywords in international development.

In research, we recognize "quality" to mean not only the "quality" of research outputs but also of development objectives and research approaches, such as promoting trilateral cooperation, strengthening a linkage between public institutes and private companies, and transferring research outputs to the target users and beneficiaries.

In this symposium, we will showcase some significant highlights of JIRCAS international research collaborations implemented under the current medium-term plan covering the financial years of 2011 to 2015, as well as relevant outcomes of other studies conducted by our research partners while considering how this research relates to quality. Finally, we will identify the future direction of international agricultural research and the steps that must be taken in order to contribute towards high quality development.

We, JIRCAS, function as a center of agricultural research for development in Japan. Thus, we endeavor to keep our research programs timely and relevant to address important issues in a continuously changing world. We hope that this symposium would become a good opportunity for sharing our research outcomes in order to provide quality solutions to global problems.
